Constitution of Executive Council (EC) and election of Office-bearers of EC of NITW Alumni Association (NITWAA) for the block period 2020-2022. The tenure of the Office Bearers of Executive Council (EC) of NITWAA was completed on October/November 2020. I, as per the directions of the Chief Patron and Director NIT Warangal, started the process by requesting the Presidents of the Local Chapters of NITWAA to furnish the following information to initiate the constitution of the Executive Council (EC) of NITW Alumni Association for the term 2020-2022 and thereby elect the new Office-bearers of Executive Council (EC). We have collected the updated list of EC members from 25 global chapters, the contestants for the posts of office bearers of EC, namely President, Vice President and Secretary. There were three nominations for the post of President and Vice President. There were two nominations for the post of Secretary

The committee has thoroughly scrutinized the applications and found that all nominees are eligible to contest the election as per NITWAA by laws. Later there are two nominees was withdrawn from post of President and Vice President. Finally there are two nominations for each post namely President, Vice president and Secretary. Online Meeting was held on 05th of December, 2020 (5.00 pm onwards). Each contestant has given their presentation for the 15min time about vision/idea to development and strengthening of NITWAA next two years.



As per NITWAA Election Schedule, the polling was opened on (09.12.2020) at 09.00am and closed on (12.12.2020) at 05.00pm. We have provided three options to the Electoral College for casting their votes. We have received 59 valid responses through Google Form (Ballot Form) and 16 valid mails of Ballot paper through Email. We had done the counting process through online in the presence of Contesting Candidates and all EC Members. Few members were physically verified the counting process. Prof. N.V. Ramana Rao was born on 25 November 1961 in Kodad, Nalgonda District, Telangana State. He obtained his bachelor's degree (B.Tech) in Civil Engineering from Osmania University Hyderabad in 1983 and Masters (M.E) from Indian Institute of Technology Delhi in 1985. He obtained his Ph.D. in Structural Engineering from University of Wales at Swansea (UK) in 1992 under Commonwealth Scholarship, and pursued his Post-Doctorate from University of Wales Swansea (UK) in 1998 under Commonwealth Fellowship. He also obtained a Postgraduate Diploma in Computer Science from Central University of Hyderabad in 1999.

Prof. N.V. Ramana Rao worked as Assistant Professor in Civil Engineering in JNTU Hyderabad from 1985-1991 as Associate Professor from 1991-99. He became Professor in 1999 and taught several courses to the satisfaction of UG and PG students. He has edited 3 books and published 157 papers in International Journals/International Conferences/ National Journals/ National Conferences. He has Organized 12 Conferences/workshops Delivered 15 invited lectures. He has guided more than 60 M.Tech. Projects and 12 Ph.D's and his guiding at present few Ph.Ds.

He is a well-known Administrator, Teacher & Consultant in the field of Civil and Structural engineering in the twin cities of Hyderabad and Secunderabad. He has more than 35 years of experience in Teaching, Research and Consultancy. He has held several academic and administrative positions at JNTU Hyderabad as Coordinator, Entrepreneur Development Cell (EDC) from 01.08.2002 to 31.01.2004 as Director of Bureau of Industrial Consultancy Research & Development (BICARD) from 22.09.2003 to 05.05.2006, as Principal from 30.04.2008 to 24.11.2011, as Registrar from 30.04.2012 to 21.07.2015 and as Rector from 01.05.2016 to 20.10.2017. He was appointed as Director, National Institute of Technology, Warangal on 23.10.2017 for a period of 5 years by the President of India. He has visited US, UK, Bangkok, Mauritius, Macau, China, Spain, Taiwan and Portugal for academic collaborations and Research

He has won Several Awards/Prizes/Certificates. To name a few, Outstanding Concrete Engineer Award for the year 2012 by A.P. He has been awarded the 1998 Commonwealth Fellowship to pursue Post-Doctoral research at the University of Wales Swansea, U.K., Young Engineer Award for the year 1995 by Government of Andhra Pradesh and Institution of Engineers, India, A.P. State Center. He was awarded the 1989 Commonwealth Scholarship to pursue PhD in Structural engineering at the University of Wales, Swansea, UK.

He has been a Member of Academic Senate, JNTU, Hyderabad, Technical Expert Committee Member of City Police Commissionerate Integrated Command & Control Center and Head Quarters Building, Past Chairman of the Indian Concrete Institute - AP Hyderabad Center, Past Secretary of the Indian Concrete Institute-AP Hyderabad Center, Executive member of the Indian Institute of Bridge Engineers. He has held Membership of Several Important State level Government Committees. He has been a Member of Several AICTE Inspection Committees, Board of Studies Chairman in Civil Engineering, INTUH, Coordinator, Singareni Collieries Recruitment Test, External Expert Member of ISRO Departmental Promotion Committee (DPC). He has been nominated as an Expert Committee member constituted by the UGC for grant of Autonomous status to various Technical Institutions. He was a Subject Committee Member of Telangana State Public Service Commission. He is a member of Member of Telangana State Pollution Control Board, Expert Committee Member of Telangana State Power Generation Corporation. The 18th Convocation of the institute for the academic year 2019-20 was held online on 31st October 2020 in virtual mode. Her hobbies include listening to music, watching movies and reading management related books. Ms. Subramanian is also a fitness enthusiast.

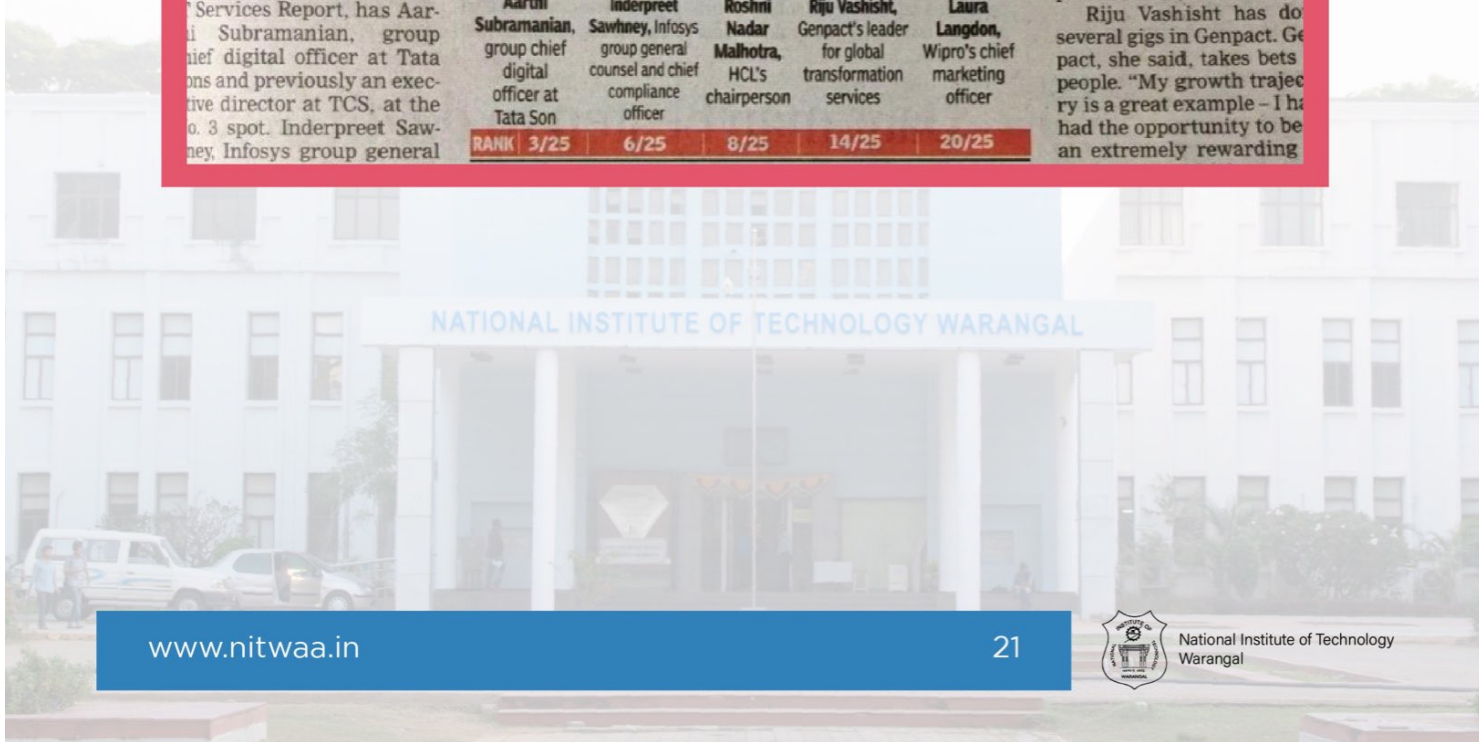

Srinidhi Varadarajan received a bachelor's degree in Electronics and Communication Engineering from NIT Warangal in 1994. He received his doctorate in Computer Science from Stony Brook University in 2000, specializing in Computer Networks. His academic research interests are in the area of high performance computer systems. In particular, fault tolerance in large-scale distributed systems, network emulation, network routing algorithms and parallel simulation algorithms. 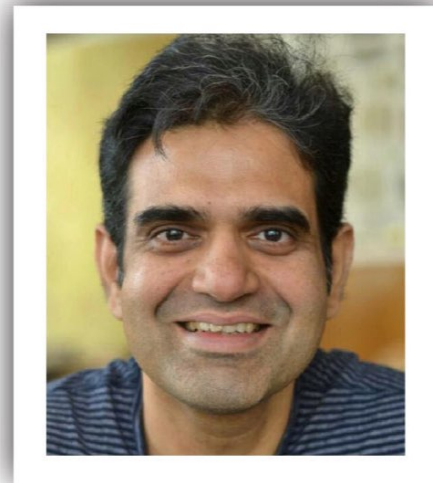
After the acquisition of Cloudistics, Srinidhi is currently the Senior Vice President of Solutions at Fungible, Inc. USA.

Maybe it was meant to be; thankfully, I understand the Laws of Physics a little better than the biology of Vitamin M and all the hormones that rise in one's body on the sound of 'a perfect job/career'. It would be absolutely pitiful if you only thought that Chemical Engineering is just pure old plain chemistry and are wondering why on earth am I talking about the 'Laws of Physics'. I could go on and on without a point to talk upon, but there is a word limit to this article. I never thought I could write articles when I was back in school, let alone publish papers in peer reviewed Journals. What the environment does to you is instil beliefs! Do we really know what we are chasing? Did you ever realize that "my interest to study engineering" is not actually your own interest, but has been engrained on you by the environment in which you lived? Biswanath Rath is an Indian film director, screenwriter, editor and producer. During 2007-2010, he worked in Maruti Suzuki India Limited after which he moved to Chennai for learning film making. At Chennai, he completed formal courses in Screenwriting and Film Direction and started his film-making career.

In 2015, he founded film production company BnR Films LLP with his wife Archana Rath.

His films have received Awards and Recognitions in a total of 215 International Film Festivals.

His first short film *Kar Bhalaa* has garnered a total of 42 International Film Festivals nominations and three awards. His debut music video was *Feel the passion*. It has received 21 International Film Festival nominations. His first ad-film *The 'Right' Glass* is a social ad-film based on Child Rights, which has garnered two awards and 59 International Film Festival nominations. His Tamil Music Video *Namma Chennai Chancey Illa*, produced by National Daily *The Times of India* with the theme 'Celebration of Chennai and its culture', was premiered at *TourFilm Riga - Tourism Film Festival* in 2017. This video is a spiritual successor to *Chancey Illa* (2014). His English Documentary *A Zero to Hero Collaborative Approach*, released on *World Food Day* (2016) received 'Audience Award' at *AgriCulture Film Festival* held at Rome (Italy) on 9 December 2017. This documentary tells the inspirational success story of collaboration between *Dangarbheja Gram Panchayat* (Nabarangpur) and a Civil Society Organisation named *Govindalaya*.

His Silent Short Film 'New Champion' received 'Best Films in Indian Panorama' Award at CMS International Children's Film Festival at Lucknow on 9 April 2018.

His latest English Documentary Kotpad Weaving : The Story of a Race Against Time, was telecasted on DD National on 24 March 2018. This documentary explores the uniqueness of Kotpad Handloom, the issues and possible solutions for revival of Kotpad Weaving and Dyeing. The film had its Australian Premiere at Sydney on 15 November 2018 as part of a Handloom exhibition titled 'The Kotpad Collection' organised by brand 'Kay Collections' (founded by Kushma Ram). It had its Indian Premiere at Kashmir World Film Festival, Srinagar on 30 November 2018 where it won 'Best Short Documentary' award. The film also features Padma Shri award recipient (2019) Gobardhan Panika. The documentary film has garnered a total of 27 International Film Festivals nominations and two awards. This film is World's first documentary film on Kotpad Handloom. In June 2020, the film premiered on Amazon Prime US, UK, Canada, Australia and other English-speaking territories of Amazon Prime, making it the first documentary from Odisha to feature on a major global OTT platform.

In June 2020, his romantic Odia Music Video '*Barshaa Bhijaa Raati*' premiered on an OTT named 'IndieShorts', making it the first Odia Music Video to feature on a National OTT platform.

In August 2020, his Hindi Music Video '*Woh Bhi Kya Din the Yaar*' themed on 'friendship' premiered on YouTube on Friendship day. This music video is India's first independently made crowd-sourced Music Video.
